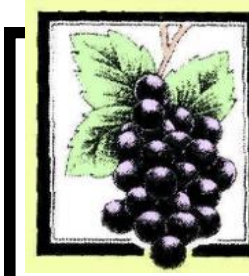

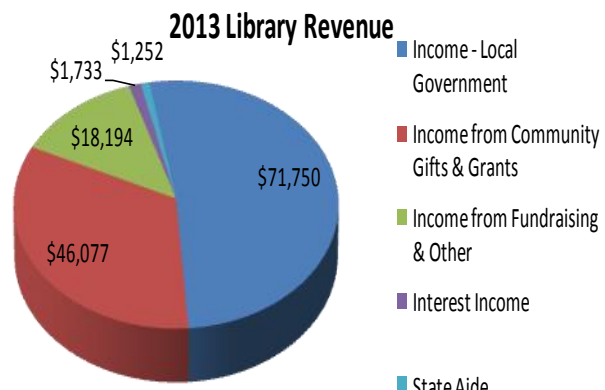
My childhood library had books and newspapers. Our library has books, magazines, CD's, DVD's, laptops and games and toys for children to play with.

My childhood library had hard copy books. Our library has hard copy books, books on CD's and you can download electronic books to your personal device.

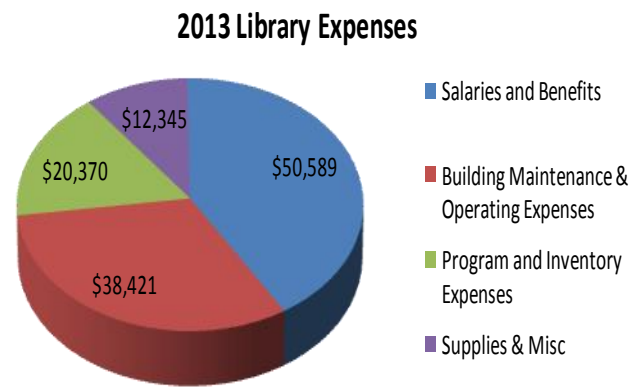
I don't remember my childhood library offering anything but an opportunity to check out books. In 2013, 1923 people attended a total of 172 programs sponsored by our library.
