Marilyn has been an integral part of the LIBRARY, old and new, & it won't be the same without her.



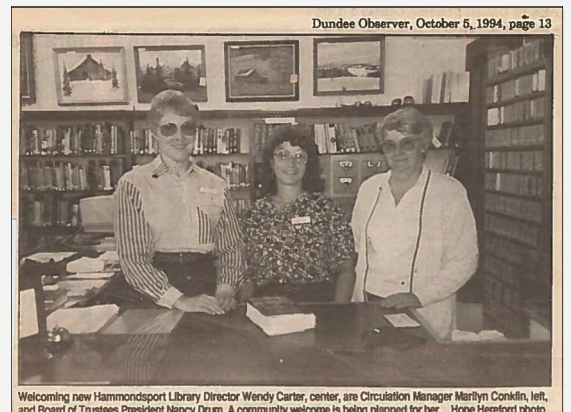

What are you going to do, Marilyn?

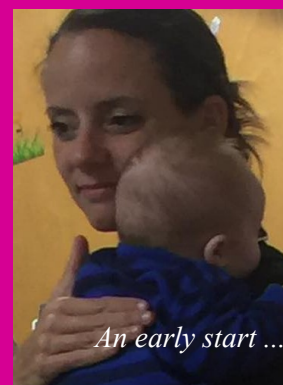

Our *Amber Stevens* Receives Well-deserved Award by Taking “Story Time” to the Next Level

On March 7, 2018, Amber Stevens, the Fred & Harriett Taylor Memorial Library Literacy Coordinator, was recognized as the Steuben County Youth Board’s **“Gary Pruyn Youth Service Worker of the Year Award”** for her outstanding program called **Little Bookworms**. Amber developed this comprehensive program for infants through preschool, to include direct involvement of caregivers.

Amber creates a weekly lesson plan that includes oral reading of children’s books, movement activity that focuses on large motor skills, a nutritious snack for both children and caregivers, a rotation of activity centers that stimulates cognitive skills, sensory awareness and small motor skills, a “play” period that encourages socialization and caregiver networking opportunities. She also creates technology tips and take-home activities for caregivers to use at home to reinforce the weekly curriculum. It all comes together in an exciting way.

Because the quality of this program is so exceptional, attendance may reach as many as 50 participants. Due to parental demand, the weekly program went from 60 to 90 minutes this year and Amber has agreed to continue the program during the regular Summer Reading Program in July and August.

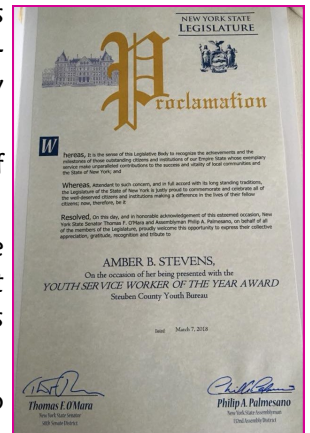
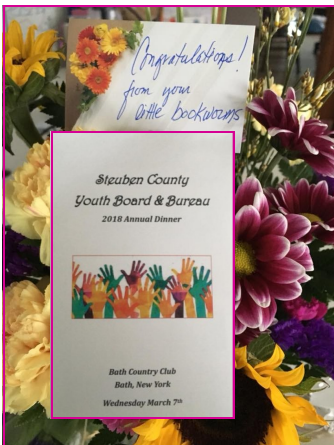
A NY State certified elementary teacher with a concentration in special education, Amber taught grades 4, 5, and 6 for ten years before she “retired” to concentrate on the child rearing of her three children. She is a born teacher and can’t stop. Passionately dedicated to children and their literacy and cognitive development, she has boundless

enthusiasm, which is contagious. She puts in numerous hours planning and preparing unique and meaningful weekly programs, such as Cozy Care during the illness season, Potty Training, Jammie Time, Cleanliness, Gardening, and more.

Amber says she looks to provide programs that she herself would love to come to with her children.

Amber also maintains the children’s literacy section of the library’s Facebook page to encourage parental involvement and to keep the public aware of the offerings for children, as well as the weekly activities.
